Why is it heard every day at many schools in Japan?

There's a history about it.

When the siren rang, I was awaken even at midnight, put on an air-raid hood called Bokuzukin, wore a rucksack with roasted rice, hardtack or kanpan inside and hung a water bottle on my shoulder.

Then I escaped in my house's shelter called Bokugo or the graveyard with grandparents and sisters.

My hometown Hagi in Yamaguchi Prefecture has a lot of temples which have their own graveyards at the back.

Graveyards were completely dark at night. So I guess my father thought the places were safe from enemy air planes.

Window-glasses in my house were pasted some paper and electric lights were covered with cloth not to leak light.

So my house was dim inside all day long.

Fortunately my family didn't suffer war damage.

But my husband's family had serious damage.

They lived in Osaka city. His father went to a battle field and was interned in Siberia for a long

time.

He himself was evacuated to Yoshino in Nara with other school children.

His sisters went to relative's house in countryside. At the end of war, his house and all the neighborhoods were attacked and burned down.

Recently the world smells something burning.

I'm afraid Japan may be stepping into war again.

"No more war!" To do so, we must keep 'The ninth article of the war-renouncing constitution."

No more children have the same experiences as mine.
